



A plan to oust and prosecute the illegal Nazi-Apartheid-Christofascist-Incel (NACI) regime that has seized unconstitutional power in the United States

## **Introduction**

The United States currently faces the gravest danger it has faced in our history as a nation.

**During the Civil War, at no point did the federal government fall to a rebel regime with ties to foreign enemies of the United States.** Yet that is where the Donald Trump-Elon Musk-JD Vance regime has now placed the nation. The Nazi-Apartheid-Christofascist-Incel (involuntary celibate) regime is thus named because of the Trump regime's base of political support. This base includes Nazi sympathizers and Adolf Hitler admirers (including Trump and Musk), segregationists and racists with roots in South African apartheid (Musk, Peter Thiel, David Sacks, Roloef Botha, Rodney Sacks, Hilton Schlosberg, and Patrick Soon-Shiong), Christofascists (including Vice President JD Vance, Attorney General Pam Bondi, and Project 2025's Russell Vought, who is now director of the Office of Management and Budget), and incels (a number of misogynistic far-right males who demean women at every chance. The latter includes Musk "Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) fanboys, Proud Boys, Groypers, etc.).

The timid corporate media has shied away from calling the present political situation a "constitutional crisis." It is far beyond that. The Civil War triggered by the secession of eleven slave-owning states was a constitutional crisis because the federal government in Washington held and defeated the secessionists. Watergate was a constitutional crisis because President Richard Nixon temporarily defied the will of the Congress. The federal government held and Nixon resigned in 1974. What the NACI regime has undertaken is an "unconstitutional usurpation" of power by the executive branch over an acquiescent legislature led by NACI politicians and a somewhat defiant judiciary that has no power to enforce its decisions.

Musk may see his assault on the U.S. government as a "hostile takeover" in the same manner he has acquired, and subsequently destroyed, many companies over the years, including Twitter, Tesla, SolarCity, and others, but in reality, it is a coup d'état. Considering Musk's close relationships with the governments of Russia, China, Turkey, India, and some two dozen neo-Nazi political parties around the world, Musk's siege of the federal government, with the backing of a dementia-addled Trump, calls for immediate action to bring the curtain down on the treasonous NACI regime.

At the present moment, opposition to the NACI regime has a unique opportunity to manifest itself. Tens of thousands of seasoned Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) special agents; Central Intelligence Agency case officers, field agents, and non-official cover personnel; active duty military officers and enlisted personnel; and other specially-trained personnel of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms, Drug Enforcement Administration, Federal

Protective Service, State Department Bureau of Diplomatic Security, Internal Revenue Service, Customs and Border Protection, and countless others have been threatened and marginalized by the NACI regime. Most would avidly join an effort to restore the constitutional republic whatever the danger or cost. The time to act is now.

The internal federal government opposition to the NACI regime has already manifested itself in a leaked report, some of it from classified sources, outlining the damage Musk and the DOGE have caused. The report, dated Feb. 5, 2025 lists four major problems brought about by DOGE:

1. “Musk-aligned operatives have seized control of the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), purging career civil servants and installing loyalists with ties to Musk’s private ventures.
2. DOGE has deployed unvetted hires—many under 25 years old—who now wield de facto control over sensitive government functions without security clearances. These individuals, drawn from Musk’s orbit and Silicon Valley’s neo-reactionary (NRx) network, operate without legal oversight or accountability.
3. DOGE has gained read-write access over Treasury pipes and federal payment systems, granting Musk direct influence over the financial infrastructure of the U.S. government. This unprecedented control over money flows creates a national security risk and a personal power lever for Musk.
4. The congressionally mandated divestment of TikTok has been delayed, with reported Chinese interest in Musk as a buyer. If successful, Musk would control not just X (formerly Twitter) but also the largest platform shaping youth political discourse—further concentrating his influence over public opinion.”

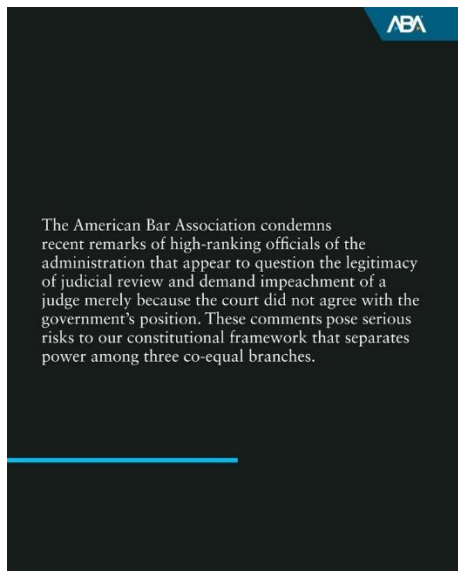


The leaked report also points to Musk and his DOGE taking orders not from Trump but from Vladimir Putin, specifically stating, “Musk had been in regular contact with Russian President Vladimir Putin since late 2022, discussing various topics, including geopolitical matters.” These topics included the situation in Ukraine and Taiwan.

Trump increasingly has shown himself to be the president in name only. Beside the fact that as a native born South African, Musk is ineligible to serve as president according to the Constitution, Musk was elected by no one and, in a mere three weeks following Trump’s inauguration, is occupying the Oval Office and meeting foreign leaders at the White House

mimicking the role of the president. For example, on February 13, 2025, Musk welcomed Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Musk's close friend, to the White House.

The leaked report is a call to arms for everyone committed to protecting America's democracy. The language is stark: "Rather than operating as an ally of the Trump administration, Musk has hijacked its ambitions for his own purposes. His rapid takeover of federal infrastructure mirrors the broader ambitions of the neo-reactionary (NRx) (a nicer name than Nazi) movement—a small group of Silicon Valley elites who reject democracy and seek to install a "CEO Monarch" to rule by technological and financial dominance. This network includes Peter Thiel, Marc Andreessen, Balaji Srinivasan, David Sacks, and Curtis Yarvin, among others. Once considered fringe, purveyors of this ideology have now been embedded into the core of government operations." Musk, the chief techno-monarchist who is unconstitutionally cutting



congressionally-approved appropriated funds to states, cities, universities, and other recipients and who refers to Americans receiving social security, Medicare, Medicaid, food assistance, and veterans' benefits as the "parasite class" is an unelected usurper. The NECG's goal, in addition to returning the United States to constitutional rule, is to closely examine Musk's own immigration status, prosecute him by a special military commission, and, if he is found guilty, reserve the right to subject him to capital punishment. The justice meted out to the Lincoln assassination conspirators and Nazi saboteurs – execution by hanging and the electric chair, respectively -- should be the same to someone who illegally seized the power of the presidency by electoral fraud and co-opting Mr. Trump, a

convicted criminal.

There is a false expectation that the judiciary will hold amid the NACI coup. The Republican 6 on the Supreme Court should disabuse anyone of the notion that the judiciary, which has no mechanism to enforce its rulings, even if they should rule against Trump's totalitarian gambit. The normally staid American Bar Association (ABA) sent out a warning that the position of the federal courts is in jeopardy. For the ABA, that was tantamount to pulling the fire alarm. The techno-oligarchs decided to use a drug-addled Trump to scrap democracy. Cynically, they came up with a term for the puppet Trump regime: "Trumphenreich."

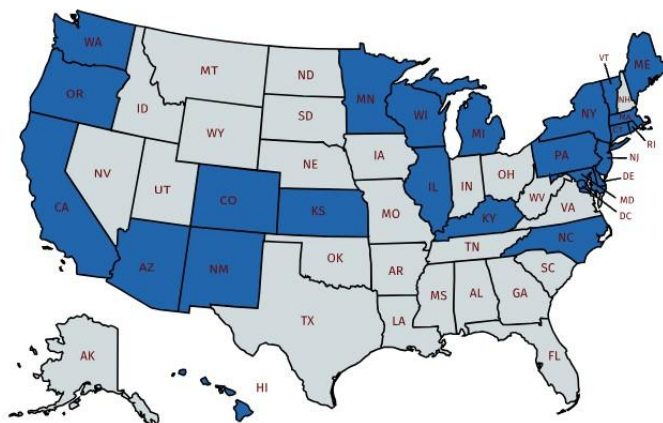
When apprehended by the forces of the NECG, Donald John Trump, a convicted felon, adjudicated sexual assaulter, seditious, and insurrectionist, shall be shown no quarter nor courtesies. He shall be treated in the manner of any criminal and traitor against his country.

The following plan lays out a road map to end the current fascist madness and return the nation to constitutional governance.

### 1.0 Mobilization

Due to the NACI's occupation of the Department of Defense, Democratic and anti-NACI Republican governors (there is currently only one, the governor of Vermont) should immediately mobilize their National Guards, including air elements, state police tactical units, and state homeland security elements and declare states of emergency for their respective states in order to stifle Republican attempts within their state legislatures to counter their actions.

Anti-NACI U.S. governors or states and territories, along with sovereign tribal executives, should establish a National Emergency Council of Governors (NECG) tasked with ousting, by force, if necessary, the rogue regime that has seized power within the federal executive branch. The NECG executive shall consist of Governors Gretchen Whitmer (MI), Tim Walz (MN), Kathy Hochul (NY), Gavin Newsom (CA), Ned Lamont (CT), J.B. Pritzker (IL), Josh Shapiro (PA), Phil Murphy (NJ), Tony Evers (WI), Maura Healey (MA), Dan McKee (RI), Katie Hobbs (AZ), Jared Polis (CO), Matt Meyer (DE), Wes Moore (MD), Josh Green (HI), Laura Kelly (KS), Michelle Lujan Grisham (NM), Andy Beshear (KY), Tina Kotek (OR), Janet Mills (ME), Bob Ferguson (WA), Josh Stein (NC), Phil Scott (VT), Lou Leon Guerrero (Guam), and Albert Bryan (VI).



National Emergency Council of Governors (NECG)

■ NECG

At an agreed-upon date, an NECG announcement establishing itself as the legitimate government of the United States of America as constituted in 1789 (Constitutional United States of America - CUSA) should be made by the Democratic governors of the States of Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North

Carolina, Washington, Oregon, New Mexico, Kansas, Arizona, Colorado, California, and Hawaii, the Commonwealths of Pennsylvania and Kentucky, the anti-NACI Republican governor of

Vermont, the mayor of the District of Columbia, and the governors of the territories of the U.S. Virgin Islands and Guam.

The NECG shall reach out to former Presidents Joe Biden, Barack Obama, George W. Bush, and Bill Clinton, as well as to former Vice Presidents Kamala Harris, Mike Pence, Dick Cheney, Al Gore, and Dan Quayle for legacy support in removing the NACI regime.

The legal and constitutional basis for the NECG rests upon the fact that it was the NACI regime that, at its outset, proceeded to violate the Constitution, with Trump, Vance, and others quite purposely violating their oaths of office to the Constitution by, among other illegalities, authorize the world's wealthiest person, Musk, to begin dismantling the U.S. government in a virtual coup d'état against the constitutional republic. The NECG will not be a successor state to the United States of America, but a continuation state of the United States of America as constituted on March 4, 1789 after nine states ratified the U.S. Constitution. The NACI regime is in opposition to the U.S. Constitution and therefore is not recognized as the continuation state of the United States of America under international law. The NECG will request that all nations with which the United States maintains diplomatic relations recognize the NECG as the lawful government of the United States. The NACI regime's ambassadors, envoys, consul generals, and consuls will be requested to vacate their offices and turn over the functions of embassies, the U.S. Missions to the United Nations in New York and Geneva, consulates-general, consulates, and special missions to representatives designated by the NECG.

All citizens of the United States who declare their allegiance to the CUSA governed on an interim basis by the NECG shall conform to the following:

- a. Take no orders or abide by any direction from the NACI regime.
- b. Stand by to support directives from the CUSA, until the federal republic of the United States as originally constituted with the ratification of the U.S. Constitution in 1789 is restored.
- c. Pay no taxes or any other monies, fees, etc. to the federal government until further notice.
- d. The possibility of hostilities will be real with loyalists to the NACI regime. As such, all citizens in any armed or law enforcement capacity will take any necessary action they deem appropriate, until such time as the NECG provides additional guidance.
- e. Residents of NECG states shall adhere to emergency declarations enacted by their governors, which may include but not be limited to the total call-up of National Guard and Air National Guard members, curfews, rationing of fuel, and commandeering of commercial aircraft for the rapid movement of critical personnel.

f. The NECG will establish a media office that will be empowered to release official statements and directives from the legitimate government of the United States as constituted under emergency provisions set forth by the NECG.

The NECG would be no different than the Free French government that fought to liberate France from the Nazi collaborationist Vichy regime. The Trump-Musk regime is, basically, no different from Vichy or the several other Nazi puppet governments established by fascists in Slovakia, Croatia, Norway, Netherlands, Belgium, Yugoslavia, and Greece during World War II. It is obvious that Trump and Musk take their orders from a foreign hostile and fascist power, the Putin regime in Russia.

The NECG would become the legitimate government of the United States to replace one that seized power as the result of Trump and Musk conspiring to hack the vote tabulators in the 2024 presidential and select elections for the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives.



Musk made a number of statements, as has Trump, pointing to computer malfeasance in the 2024 election. On June 16, 2024, Musk, who had already pledged his support and some \$250 million to Trump’s campaign, wrote, “anything can be hacked.” Musk was referring to the vulnerability of India’s electronic voting machines (EVMs) to hacking in its 2024 general election. He was also responding to Robert F. Kennedy Jr.’s unsubstantiated charge that Puerto Rico’s recent

primary election was rigged by hacking.

Following Trump’s alleged election victory on November 5, Trump thanked Musk at a victory rally, stating that his role in helping him win in Pennsylvania was the result of Musk knowing “those vote counting computers.” Earlier, Trump gave away the plot when he spoke to the far-right Turning Point Action conference in June 2024, saying, “We don’t need votes.” Ever since the 2000 election, it has been pointed out that the ES&S tabulating computers used to count votes had serious security flaws. That firm’s systems are used in the swing states that all saw Trump wins. Exploiting software flaws would not have been difficult for Musk and the type of employees with computer hacker profiles that he prefers to hire.

### 1.1 Outreach to America’s traditional allies

The NECG, which should take its inspiration from the U.S. Constitution and Declaration of Independence, should reach out to America’s traditional allies for both assistance and diplomatic recognition during the actions to be taken to retake the reins of power in Washington, DC.

The NECG members from states bordering Canada -- which is being threatened with annexation by the NACI regime -- should be specifically tasked to coordinate with the Canadian federal government in Ottawa and the premiers of anti-NACI provinces the addition of Canadian Armed Forces and provincial police of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, and British Columbia assistance to the NECG in vacating the rogue NACI regime in Washington, DC and, in particular, NACI-aligned state capitals. The authority for the NECG to seek assistance from the government of Canada is pursuant to the North Atlantic Treaty, signed in Washington, D.C. on April 4, 1949, which established the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), of which Canada is a founding member. The Canadian Armed Forces consists of a regular force of 68,000 personnel and a reserve force of 27,000 personnel, bringing the total number of personnel to approximately 95,000.

The NECG shall establish with the Government of Canada a Joint Command consisting of NECG National Guard commands, Canadian Armed Forces commands, NECG state police, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), and the provincial police forces of cooperating Canadian provinces, which might not include either Alberta or Saskatchewan, which are loyal at the present time to the NACI regime in Washington. The Blue State-Canada Alliance shall form the core of an anti-NACI pact aimed at eliminating the NACI regime that threatens both the CUSA and Canada.

Pursuant to NATO commitments, the NECG shall also be authorized to reach out to NATO member states that support the return of democratic rule in the United States. The Weimar Plus group of NATO nations plus the EU (France, Germany, Poland, Spain, Italy, the United Kingdom, and the European Union), which opposes Trump's tilt toward Russia and against Ukraine, would be in the best position to support NECG. Of these member states, Denmark, whose sovereignty over Greenland is also being threatened by the NACI regime in Washington, would be well-disposed to assist the NECG, mostly by providing diplomatic support within the Nordic Council (Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Greenland, Åland, and Faroes) and the European Union.

## **1.2 Neutralizing the Trump-Musk elements within the federal government**

The first priority of the NECG should be to secure the Departments of State, Treasury, Homeland Security, and Defense, not necessarily in that order but as favorable circumstances warrant. Also of top priority is CUSA's securing of the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia and National Weather Service (NWS) headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland. Both agencies are vital to the health and safety of the American people. The securing of NWS should not be an issue for the combined forces of the Maryland National Guard and State Police. However, the fact that CDC is in Republican-governed Georgia may necessitate the use



of the Atlanta Police Department's Special Operations Section and the Fulton County Sheriff's Office's Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT), Crisis Negotiation Unit, and Drone Unit to secure the CDC from any hostile internal security forces. It is known that NACI has placed private military contractors, including those from Triple Canopy, inside key federal agency headquarters. The NECG should be prepared to subdue these paramilitary elements.

The overall strategy for the NECG must be the isolation of the White House from the rest of the federal government. Particular focus should be on the arrest of Elon Musk, Donald Trump, JD Vance, and their staff members followed by their quick exfiltration from Washington and severance of any control over the levers of executive power. Disruptive Trump/Musk loyalists in the Congress and on the U.S. Supreme Court should also be removed from the nation's capital until the political situation in the United States stabilizes and criminal charges of sedition and treason can be brought against them. The same measures should be taken by NECG governors with regard to NACI disruptors within their state legislatures and state supreme courts.

Armed forces loyal to the NECG shall abide by the Geneva Conventions on warfare and every opportunity shall be extended to forces commanded by elements loyal to NACI to surrender and be granted, after a thorough vetting process, the opportunity to join forces with the NECG. This offer shall be extended to the forces of the U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Marine Corps, U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Space Force, and National Guard and Air National Guard units either federalized by the NACI regime or subordinate to NACI-supporting state and territorial governors. Similar courtesies shall be extended by the NECG to members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Central Intelligence Agency Special Activities Division, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (particularly those who will be initially disarmed and isolated by NECG-Canadian forces seizing control of U.S.-Canadian border crossing facilities).

## **2.0 International Action**

After closely coordinating the planning for international action against the NACI regime, the combined forces of the NECG and the Canadian federal government and allied provinces shall move to secure the major border Canadian-US border crossings involving states that are part of the NECG. Securing the border crossings between NECG territory and Canada is paramount in order to forestall an invasion and occupation by U.S. troops loyal to the NACI regime. These strategic crossings include:

- The Ambassador Bridge crossing between Detroit and Windsor, Ontario.
- The Sault Sainte Marie border crossing between the cities of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, and Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario.
- The Niagara Falls International Rainbow Bridge between Niagara Falls, New York and Niagara Falls, Ontario.
- The Whirlpool Bridge between Niagara Falls, Ontario, and Niagara Falls, New York.

- The Lewiston–Queenston Bridge between Lewiston, New York and Queenston, Ontario.
- The Thousand Islands border crossing between Alexandria Bay, New York, and Ivy Lea, Ontario.
- The Port Huron–Sarnia crossing between Port Huron, Michigan and Sarnia, Ontario.
- The Detroit–Windsor tunnel crossing between Detroit, Michigan and Windsor, Ontario.
- The Ogdensburg–Prescott crossing between Ogdensburg, New York and Johnstown, Ontario.
- The Three Nations Crossing between Cornwall, Ontario in Canada to Massena, New York. The executives of the Mohawk Nation of Akwesasne should be consulted with a view toward receiving the support of the Mohawk First Nation for the crossborder actions taken jointly by the NECG and Canada.
- The Fort Covington–Dundee border crossing between Fort Covington, New York and Dundee, Quebec.
- The Trout River crossing between Elgin, Quebec and Constable, New York.
- The Chateaugay–Herdman crossing between Hinchinbrooke, Quebec to Chateaugay, New York.
- The Cannon Corners–Covey Hill crossing between Havelock, Quebec to Mooers Forks, New York.
- The Mooers–Hemmingford crossing between Hemmingford, Quebec, to Mooers, New York.
- The Champlain–St. Bernard de Lacolle crossing between Champlain, New York, and St-Bernard-de-Lacolle, Quebec.
- The Overton Corners–Lacolle 221 crossing between Lacolle, Quebec to Champlain, New York.
- The Rouses Point - Lacolle 223 crossing between Lacolle, Quebec and Rouses Point, New York.
- The Alburgh–Noyan crossing between Noyan, Quebec and Alburgh, Vermont.
- The Alburg Springs–Clarenceville crossing between Clarenceville, Quebec and Alburgh, Vermont.
- The Highgate Springs–St. Armand/Philipsburg crossing between Philipsburg, Quebec and Highgate Springs, Vermont.
- The Morses Line crossing between Saint-Armand, Quebec with Franklin, Vermont.
- The West Berkshire–Frelighsburg crossing between Frelighsburg, Quebec and the western portion of Berkshire, Vermont.
- The Pinnacle Road–East Pinnacle crossing between East Pinnacle, Quebec and the western portion of Richford, Vermont.
- The Richford–Abercorn crossing between Abercorn, Quebec and Richford, Vermont.

- The East Richford–Glen Sutton crossing between Sutton, Quebec and Richford, Vermont.
- The North Troy–Highwater crossing between Highwater, Quebec and North Troy, Vermont.
- The Beebe Plain–Beebe crossing between Rue Principale (Quebec Route 247) in Beebe Plain, Quebec and Beebe Road in Beebe Plain, a village in Derby, Vermont.
- The Derby Line–Stanstead crossing between Stanstead, Quebec and Derby Line, Vermont.
- The Derby Line–Rock Island crossing between Stanstead, Quebec and Derby Line, Vermont.
- The Norton–Stanhope crossing between Stanhope, Quebec and Norton, Vermont.
- The Canaan–Hereford Road crossing between Saint-Herménégilde, Quebec and Canaan, Vermont.
- The Beecher Falls–East Hereford crossing between East Hereford, Quebec and the village of Beecher Falls, Vermont.
- The Pittsburg–Chartierville crossing between Chartierville, Quebec and Pittsburg, New Hampshire. In this case, New Hampshire state police and National Guard units that may initially pledge loyalty to NACI loyalist governor Kelly Ayotte should be given the chance to surrender and join forces with the NECG and Canada. If they refuse, they should be overwhelmed with superior force and disarmed. Contingency plans should include the arrest by NECG and Canadian forces of the Republican governor and president of the New Hampshire Senate in Concord if they continue to support the NACI regime. It is essential that all the U.S.-Canadian border crossings in the northeastern United States be secured in order to facilitate the movement of military supplies and personnel from Canada and, potentially, other NATO allies, including France, the United Kingdom, and Germany, into the NECG-controlled United States.
- The Coburn Gore–Woburn crossing between Woburn, Quebec, and Coburn Gore, Maine.
- The Armstrong–Jackman crossing between Saint-Théophile, Québec, and northwest of Jackman, Maine.
- The St. Zacharie, Maine – St. Zacharie, Quebec; St. Aurelie Maine–St. Aurelie Quebec; Saint Just de Bretenières–St. Juste Maine; and Saint Pamphile crossings mostly used by logging companies.
- The Estcourt Station–Pohénégamook crossing between the villages of Estcourt Station, Maine and Pohénégamook, Quebec.
- The Fort Kent–Clair crossing between Fort Kent, Maine and Clair, New Brunswick.
- The Madawaska–Edmundston crossing between Madawaska, Maine and Edmundston, New Brunswick.

- The Van Buren–St. Leonard crossing between Van Buren, Maine and St. Leonard, New Brunswick.
- The Hamlin–Grand Falls crossing between Hamlin, Maine and Grand Falls, New Brunswick.
- The Limestone–Gillespie Portage crossing between Limestone, Maine and Grand-Sault, New Brunswick.
- The Four Falls crossing between Fort Fairfield, Maine and Four Falls, New Brunswick.
- The Easton–River de Chute crossing between Easton, Maine and Wicklow, New Brunswick.
- The Bridgewater–Centreville crossing between Bridgewater, Maine and Centreville, New Brunswick.

### 3.0 Securing U.S. military installations

NECG, acting in coordination with members of the U.S. Armed Forces who remain loyal to the Constitution shall secure all Department of Defense bases, installations, and operational units on the soil of states under the control of the NECG. This shall be accomplished by using mobilized National Guard units answerable only to the NECG, as well as through the use of tactical and special units of state police agencies in NECG states. Emphasis should be placed on assuring that the primary missions of operational facilities serving the national defense needs of the Constitutional United States of America continue as unimpeded as possible. In states having Democratic governors but having a large number of NACI sympathizers in state legislatures and elsewhere – Kansas, Kentucky, North Carolina, and Arizona as examples -- the securing of federal military installations may require assistance from less encumbered NECG states and/or Canadian military forces. Facilities to be secured by the NECG include:

### **3.1 Closure of Interstate highway traffic from states subservient to the NACI regime**

The NECG governors will impose traffic blockades on states remaining loyal to the NACI regime in Washington. All authorized vehicular traffic from NACI states will be subjected to searches. Exempted from security blockades will be medical emergency vehicles such as ambulances and military, National Guard, and law enforcement personnel from NACI-controlled states declaring their loyalty to the NECG and the Constitutional United States of America.

NECG governors will utilize weigh stations, turnpike toll plazas, welcome centers, and state police and highway patrol stations to limit the flow of hostile or unauthorized traffic from NACI-governed states.

### **3.2 Securing Federal Courthouses and Judges loyal to their constitutional oaths**

Security forces under the direction of the NECG shall immediately secure all U.S. Federal Courthouses in their jurisdictions and provide protection for constitutionally loyal judges in each U.S. judicial district under the control of the NECG. The American Bar Association said in a strong statement that the Trump-Musk government was pose “serious risks to our constitutional framework that separates power among the three co-equal branches.” Clearly, the ABA, which issues recommendations or declinations on nominated federal judges, would find the NACI regime in total contravention of the Constitution. It would then be left to the NECG to remedy the situation.

### **3.3 Securing Airspace over NECG states and territories**

The NECG shall close the airspace over their states and territories to all but authorized aircraft responsible for extricating the NACI regime from power.

Coordinating with constitutionally loyal officials of the Federal Aviation Administration, the NECG will secure the following Air Route Traffic Control Centers (ARTCC):

The NECG will assume responsibility for air traffic control involving the following airports. These airports will also be secured by forces of the NECG :to protect them from NACI use and to facilitate, as necessary, the movement of National Guard, Air National Guard, Canadian Armed Forces, and/or other allied forces, including Armed Forces of the United States pledging loyalty to the Constitutional United States of America. The NECG shall take all measures necessary to establish air superiority over the states and territories of the Constitutional United States of America.

### **3.4 Securing National Parks by the NECG**

To prevent U.S. National Parks, National Monuments, National Forests, and Wilderness Area from being used by the NACI regime to stage military and paramilitary forces, including private

military contractors such as Triple Canopy and Academi, that threaten the security of states under NECG administration, the forces of the NECG and allies like Canada shall secure the territories of and airspace above National Parks, National Monuments, National Forests, and Wilderness Areas. This provision shall apply to the following locations:

#### **4.0 Restoration of the Constitutional United States of America**

The fact that those responsible for the NACI attack on the United States have unsavory connections to the most anti-democratic political forces in the world, requires justice to be meted out to the perpetrators by a Special Military Commission (SMC), judges to be appointed after an agreement of the members of the NECG. The Commission should take special note of the fact that several of the oligarchs who are backing the NACI have their roots in South Africa. They include Musk, David Sacks, Roloef Botha (grandson of apartheid South Africa's final foreign minister), Rodney Sacks, Hilton Schlosberg, and Patrick Soon-Shiong, the latter the right-wing billionaire owner of *The Los Angeles Times*. They were born in the apartheid-era nation and subsequently emigrated to the United States. Peter Thiel, born in Germany to German parents, lived as a youth in Swakopmund, a very pro-Nazi city in what was South West Africa



and os now Namibia. There is informed speculation that Thiel's father, a uranium mining engineer, assisted the apartheid regime's illegal development of nuclear weapons. Their combined support for the NACI regime should invalidate their citizenship and they should be deported even if they are found not guilty of sedition and treason by the SPC.

#### **4.1 Punishing the NACI regime**

The Special Military Commission that would prosecute Elon Musk, Donald Trump, and other criminals who seized power in the 2024 election as a result of criminal malfeasance of the highest degree would involve a thorough investigation and gathering of evidence by civilian attorneys and investigators, U.S. military Judge Advocates General, and international attorneys as required. The Commission would be entitled to expropriate all of Musk's assets and distribute those assets to employees, shareholders, creditors, and the U.S. Treasury.

The advantage of a Special Military Commission to try Trump, Musk, and others for sedition is well-grounded in American law. Trump and his supporters committed sedition against the United States on January 6, 2021, and again during the 2024 election campaign when Musk, Thiel, and other techno-fascists were permitted to interfere with vote tabulation to favor Trump and Thiel's acolyte, JD Vance. Military commissions can act swiftly, thus avoiding the lengthy procedures of civilian courts. Military commissions also offer a more controlled environment.

The Lincoln administration used military commissions to try Confederate saboteurs and conspirators. In extraordinary circumstances, like the present one, such commissions have been used when civilian courts were seen as ineffective or compromised. In light of Trump's and Musk's threats to ignore court rulings, the federal courts have been neutralized and compromised. Compromised judges include but not limited to Aileen Cannon in the southern district of Florida and Matthew Kacsmaryk in the northern district of Texas.

It was Trump's abuse of the courts after January 6 that permitted him to launch another attack on the rule of law to ensure another presidential term. This playing fast and loose with the Constitution should have never been tolerated, yet it was. It would be up to a Special Military Commissions to right the wrongs committed by the Supreme Court in granting Trump almost monarchical powers and Biden administration Attorney General Merrick Garland for being asleep at the wheel of justice.

The father of the U.S. Constitution, President Thomas Jefferson, wrote: "When tyranny becomes law, rebellion becomes duty." That duty has now fallen on Americans everywhere to answer the call.
